Mahmoud Amer

Professional Statement

I would be honored to serve CALICO in any capacity. I have been a member of CALICO for nine consecutive years, but my work and scholarship have been at the heart of what CALICO does since 2004, when I first started building mobile apps for the S60 Symbian platform (the software that powered millions of Nokia lines before Android and iOS) for my students. I am fortunate to have witnessed a sustained growth in technology in the last decade and I am proud to call CALICO my home for professional and scholarly work, having been no stranger to being an active member in equally respectable organizations, including TESOL, ACTFL, AAAL, and AATA, and if elected, I pledge to reach out to our colleagues and further our collaboration.

CALICO meetings have enabled me to see the breadth, knowledge, and variety of perspectives we bring to our profession. I believe that CALICO occupies a very unique position. Because many of us in CALICO play the dual role of both creating digital content, as well as being the instructors to many of our students, we are uniquely qualified to observe the power that technology can offer to transform learning. Professional Statement

My engagement with CALICO has a long history. I was first introduced to CALICO in 2005 by my graduate advisors and founding members of CALICO, James Pusack and Sue Otto from the University of Iowa. Jim and Sue's work on creator tools for building technology-enhanced interactive activities for effective language learning inspired me to consider a doctoral degree with a specialization in educational technology, and pursue an academic career in the field of CALL. As an eager participant of our CALICO Annual Conventions, I have benefited greatly from attending annual conferences and panels (and copious CALICO meals that no other national organization can ever beat!). As my primary professional affiliation, CALICO has played an instrumental role in molding my academic career profile, and provided me with an extensive network of professional connections across the globe.

If elected as Executive Board Member, I would introduce the following initiatives to better advocate for our organization and for the work that we do: 1) I will institute an Ad-Hoc Committee on the development of initiatives that promote active and timely integration of CALL research findings in foreign language instruction and outline high-leverage CALL teaching practices in FL education. 2) I will develop a program to enhance our donor relations. By articulating to potential donors the importance of CALL research to foreign language learning in the 21st century, CALICO can broaden its appeal, establish and grow the endowment so that the Consortium can support new professional awards and fellowships for graduate students and faculty members as well as potentially help K-12 teachers to attend the annual convention and directly engage with CALL specialists. 3) I will strengthen ties among current CALICO members by establishing CALICO Expert Team Networks for cross-institutional research initiatives and provision of free consulting services on quantitative and qualitative CALL project designs.

Biostatment

Liudmila Klimanova (Ph.D. University of Iowa) is Assistant Professor of CALL at the University of Arizona. Dr. Klimanova's research program lies at the intersection of phenomenological studies of virtual L2 learner experience, translanguaging in CALL contexts, and virtual identity enactment. Her current research delves into the notions of critical virtual exchange, digital humanistic pedagogies, and space humanities, focusing, in particular, GIS mapping technologies that allow learners to experience physical and cultural spaces remotely. At the University of Arizona she serves as co-director of **The Mapping Borderlands Initiative**, a global network for critical cultural virtual exchange among borderland regions (borderlands.arizona.edu) and co-director of **LLCcommons** - an open access web-based portal for hybrid and online teaching (llc.arizona.edu). She is editor of 2022 CALICO Volume, 'Identity, Multilingualism, & CALL'. Along with more recent national initiatives, her record of service includes leadership positions at CALICO CMC SIG (2016-2018) and AAUSC

(Association of University Supervisors and Language Program Coordinators). Since 2015 she has served as reviewer for LLT, CALICO and ReCALL journals.

Professional Statement

Over the years, the CALICO community has helped me grow as a scholar and mentor. I look forward to spreading my appreciation for the organization by supporting the development of CALICO members. To do this, I am committed to devoting time and energy to collaborations that expand membership benefits and contribute to the organization's reputation.

When I first joined CALICO, I was motivated as a student to present at the conference. I've maintained membership because of the tight knit community and continued excellence in academic professionalism. As the organization grows, it will become increasingly difficult for students and newcomers to network. While networking is indeed a benefit of attending the conference, there are few efforts to facilitate networking beyond conference spaces. I would like to take an active role in formalizing a mentorship/networking program so that students, newcomers, and seasoned CALL academics and professionals have year-long support.

Membership benefits may draw individuals into the organization, but mechanisms for maintaining participation are needed. This interest could be sparked through each of the SIGs. Participating in SIGs is a membership benefit, but individuals may not be aware of what they offer. Efforts to promote and develop SIGs can improve. One suggestion would be to encourage synergistic activities that not only foster inter-SIG collaboration but also highlight activities of individual SIGs. This can be done by forming a space during the conference where SIG leaders come together to discuss collaborations and by offering a newsletter for better visualizing CALICO as a community of global leaders.

As a volunteer organization, it will take a full community to elevate CALICO to a level that it could be. As a board member, I would be interested in forming ad hoc committees to help with CALICO outreach. Together, we can build a bright future for the CALICO organization.
