I am delighted and honored to be featured in the *CALICO Graduate Student SIG Newsletter*. Since my graduation in 2013, I have been teaching ESL writing, linguistics, and language acquisition courses and focusing on Computer-Assisted Language Learning (CALL), digital literacies, and distance language education in my scholarly work. I joined CALICO in 2016. Since then, CALICO has become my professional home where I could turn to for support, collaboration, and new opportunities. Since 2016, I have attended and participated in all CALICO annual conferences. I have served as a Vice Chair and Chair of the CALICO Second Language Acquisition and Technology (SLAT) and Language Teaching and Learning Technologies (LTLT) SIGs. I am also a Book Review Editor of the *CALICO Journal*.

My advice for current CALICO graduate student members who work on their coursework would be to (1) never hesitate to ask for advice and guidance. Finding a mentor(s) is essential to your academic and professional growth; (2) plan and manage your time wisely. When choosing and developing a project for your course, it is best to complete it in the form of a presentation and/or a publication either at the end of the course or after it. This will allow you to share your work with others, to learn even more from your professors, and to build your CV; (3) be open to new ideas and reflect on your beliefs and biases. It is important to notice, value, and reflect on the moments when you learn new things that challenge your beliefs. At the dissertation stage of the doctoral studies, joining organizations such as CALICO and networking will provide support and resources for finishing a dissertation, finding a job, and growing further as a scholar after graduation. Belonging to a community of scholars is invaluable, and I highly encourage graduate students to join and actively participate in various events CALICO offers.

After graduating with a dissertation on the effectiveness of corrective feedback in digital games for language learning, I took up the role of research manager in the research group where I carried out my PhD work. Our team carries out interdisciplinary research on educational technology. My job entails defining the long-term strategy of the group with the four professors, searching for funding (i.e., grant writing) and partners (other research groups and companies) to carry out this strategy, managing research projects, and coaching our researchers. We are now a group of about 45 and collaborate with many partners, so this takes a lot of energy. I try to continue to be involved as much as possible in CALL, through research and innovation projects and through teaching: this energizes me most in my job.

CALICO is a space where you meet the people whose papers you read and can talk to them in a very congenial and lively atmosphere. Not only about the research passion you share but also about your professional goals. Developing a career in our field is not an easy task, and it can be helpful to seek advice from peers beyond your institution. CALICO brings together a community of seasoned researchers in CALL, both from academia and industry, who have gone through the questions and choices you may now be facing on your path. For me, joining CALICO has been key in figuring out what I want to do professionally, and in sticking to that plan. ### Grad SIG Panel: Alternative Career Paths with a PhD in CALL

In January, the Grad SIG organized our first free virtual panel where we had almost 90 grad students registered. In the 75-minute discussion, Dr. Lisa Frumkes, Dr. Scott Payne, and Dr. Geoff LaFlair chatted about their experiences working in both academia and industry, building on each others' anecdotes and advice. One of the reasons for the success of this panel was the speakers' diverse experiences; they all worked at the intersection of language and technology but have varying research interests and jobs throughout their career. Another aspect that made this panel successful was the openness and honesty from the presenters about their experiences, which we don't always get at more formal events.

# The Grad SIG at the CALICO 2021 Conference

## Panel: Alternative Careers with a PhD in CALL

University teaching, publishing, attending conferences, and getting tenure are emphasized in our graduate programs. We know what to expect from this job market but, what if we are interested in other professional paths? What if a university job is not our goal or there simply aren't enough jobs in academia? What if we want to explore other alternatives? If you are wondering what working outside academia looks like and want to hear some tips, join us at this graduate panel on June 2nd. Three guest speakers with experience in both contexts will share their stories working outside academia after receiving their doctorate, including tips for industry job application. ## Collaborative Research Project: Emerging Technology & L2 Speaking Skills; A Research Synthesis.

June 5th, 12:05pm PTS

This presentation will discuss the findings of a research synthesis of CALL studies regarding the teaching and learning of L2 speaking skills using technology as part of a collaborative research initiative by the CALICO Graduate Student SIG. A review of previous research syntheses of CALL research

uncovered a general lack of empirical studies regarding the teaching of L2 speaking skills using technology (especially concerning languages other than English) (Wang & Vasquez, 2012; Lin, 2014, 2015).

For this paper, CALL studies published between 2010 and 2019 in five top CALL journals were analyzed. Each article was examined and coded based on aspects of oral production investigated, types of technology used, theoretical perspectives, the context and participants, and the methodological choices presented in the article. The findings will be discussed pointing at trends of these last 10 years and suggestions for future research directions in the domain of teaching and learning L2 speaking skills in CALL. This research synthesis has implications relevant to both researchers and practitioners.
