Dear Review Committee:

Please consider this letter as my enthusiastic endorsement of **Ms. Francesca Marino** in her application for CALICO's 2024 *Robert A. Fischer Outstanding Graduate Student Award*. As Francesca's supervisor for her PhD studies, I can speak to the unique nature of her dissertation, her engagement with both CALICO and CALL more broadly, and as to why she is deserving of this award.

First and foremost, I would like to confirm that Francesca has already successfully defended her dissertation proposal. At this point in time, she has completed the process of collecting her data. She is analyzing that data, and she is on-track to graduate. As Francesca describes in her application, her study is a classroom-based, mixed methods study that examines an increasingly critical topic in the fields of applied linguistics and CALL, which involves digital multimodal composing. Notably, Francesca's study is innovative and is one of the first of its kind in our field. It also has the capacity to be of high impact since she is looking at learning Italian as a foreign language. To date, most CALL studies on the topic (a) are purely qualitative in nature, and (b) examine English language learners. As such, the scope, design, and learner population used in Francesca's study will be of much interest to researchers and teachers, both in CALL and beyond.

In terms of Francesca's dedication to and activities with CALL and CALICO, she has been quite active. For instance, she currently serves on the CALICO Graduate Student Special Interest Group, where she has organized and hosted multiple events (e.g., a reading group). She is also serving as a volunteer for the upcoming CALICO 2024 Conference. Finally, Francesca has delivered multiple presentations and lectures – both referred and invited – at the University of South Florida (USF), at local conferences, and at national conferences.

Apart from her service and dissertation work, I have served as Francesca's instructor for multiple PhD-level courses, and I have had the pleasure of collaborating with her on multiple CALL-related projects and publications (e.g., Kessler & Marino, 2023 in *ELT Journal*, and Marino et al., in press, in a volume to be published by John Benjamins). Based on my experiences working with Francesca, I can earnestly say that she is the hardest-working PhD student I have ever seen in my time at USF. Perhaps more importantly, she is also extraordinarily intelligent, kind, considerate, motivated, and responsible. As such, I believe she is a strong candidate and that she is precisely the kind of person who is worthy of receiving this award. Thank you for your consideration.

1. Provide a description of your primary research in CALL with a short justification regarding its future significance to teaching and learning.

My primary research in CALL focuses on Digital Multimodal Composing (DMC), specifically exploring its impact on learners' second language (L2) development and investment.

My dissertation (please find more details in the next box) may corroborate the importance of integrating digital multimodal approaches into L2 teaching and learning practices. Additionally, by comparing students' experiences with different types of assignments (text-based vs digital multimodal), my research will contribute to a deeper understanding of the potential benefits and challenges of incorporating DMC into L2 curricula as well as the contextual factors that shape learners' experiences. The results may also inform future L2 instructional practices and the design of digital learning tools, platforms, or practical resources that meet the needs of students engaging in DMC across various fields. While my dissertation focuses on these aspects, I am also interested in investigating other facets of DMC (e.g., meaning-making choices, and issues pertaining to accessibility).

2. Describe your CALL research undertaken: projects (e.g. CALL development, pedagogical modules, innovations...) completed and/or currently in progress perhaps as preparation for your dissertation or with another researcher.

My dissertation: Using a mixed-methods quasi-experimental design with an experimental and a comparison group, my dissertation seeks to examine the influence of a series of DMC tasks on the development of L2 skills (i.e., writing, listening, speaking, and reading skills, and grammatical competence). The study also explores DMC's impact on L2 Italian learners' investment in learning a second language. The study was conducted in two separate sections of a 15-week undergraduate Italian language I taught last fall, and I am currently in the process of analyzing the data.

CALL development: Apart from the dissertation, I plan to create resources based on its findings to help L2 learners and instructors.

Future research

- 1. A bibliometric analysis of DMC across multiple fields to gain insights into its evolution, trends, and applications;
- 2. A study exploring instructors' perceptions of the impact of Artificial Intelligence (AI) on DMC.

These studies seek to broaden our understanding of DMC's significance in various domains and offer insights into L2 learning and teaching practices.

In this paper, Dr. Matt Kessler and I discuss three DMC tasks (i.e., posters/brochures, storyboards, and video projects) and suggest tools and platforms for completing these tasks. Our evaluation was based on aspects such as ease of use, accessibility, versatility, collaboration and sharing features, and availability of educational resources and support, among others. We also discuss issues to consider when integrating DMC into L2 teaching (e.g., assessment).

I have also authored two papers that explore multimodality, specifically focusing on how users express their multimodal choices in varied online platforms. These papers have been published in *Discourse, Context, & Media* and the *Journal of Multimodal Communication*. I am interested in multimodality from both a pedagogical and discursive perspective.
