What an incredible year it has been! As we wrap up the **2024–2025 academic year**, we are thrilled to share highlights from the events we have hosted, the conversations we have started, and the community we have continued to build together. Thank you for being a part of it all.

🗢 CALICOffees: Connecting, Learning, and Growing



This year, we hosted **four CALICOffees**, each one a space for connection, conversation, and collaboration. We kicked things off in the fall with our **first CALICOffee**, a relaxed meet-up to welcome new and returning members. It was a wonderful way to reconnect after the summer, share ideas, and set the tone for the year ahead.

Our **second CALICOffee** brought together scholars and students for an insightful session on *AI*, *Critical Pedagogy, and L2 Learning*. With thought-provoking perspectives from Dr. **Bill Cope** and Dr. **Mary Kalantzis** (University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign), the discussion explored the intersections of emerging technologies, critical thinking, and socially interactive uses of AI.



The **third CALICOffee** shifted to a more hands-on format. During this event, we learned how chatbots and AI-powered tools work to support students' L2 speaking skills and provide meaningful feedback. **Ryan Detwiler** (CEO & Founder of eslvideo.com) guided us through some useful tools and strategies for implementing chatbots to help students practise speaking and learn from AI-supported interactions.








To close the CALICOffee series, our **fourth CALICOffee** featured a powerful panel discussion on *Promoting Inclusive CALL in a Diverse World*. We were honored to host Dr. **Jen Vanek** (Director of Digital Learning and Research at World Education Inc.) and Dr. **Ellen Yeh** (Associate Professor and Director of the EAL program at Columbia College Chicago), who shared their insights into building equitable digital learning spaces and supporting all learners through inclusive practices.

📚 Reading Circles: Learning Together



In addition to CALICOffees, we launched **two student-led reading circles** this year. These were close-knit gatherings that allowed us to engage more deeply with current scholarship in CALL.

Our first reading circle was led by **Melike Akay** (University of South Florida), who guided us through a discussion of an article by Robert Godwin-Jones (2021) on **big data and its implications for language learning**. The article sparked rich conversations about ethics, accessibility, and the future of data-driven pedagogy.



approaches reflect my creative, non-linear way of thinking about research, shaped by the multifaceted academic journey I have taken.

Greetings, CALICO colleagues! I'm Linda, and it has been a privilege to co-chair the Graduate Student SIG alongside Francesca this year. One of the most rewarding aspects of this role has been fostering collaboration and dialogue between emerging and established researchers across the CALL community. Alongside our SIG work, Francesca and I also co-led a study on emoji use in L2 classrooms—a project we hope to expand through future empirical research. I'm currently preparing to defend my PhD at University College London (UCL), focusing on the co-design of mobile-assisted language learning (MALL) activities for newly arrived refugee adolescents. Grounded in sociocultural-ecological theory and

design-based research, my work examines how co-created MALL tasks can support L2 development, collaboration, and personalized language learning, particularly for students with interrupted formal education. My broader research interests include AI-enhanced pedagogy, digital literacies, and inclusive CALL. I look forward to continuing to build meaningful research connections within the SIG and across the CALICO network.
